
In what way is this book a companion for people who desire to follow Jesus where they are and in what they are doing?

Amy Williams has spent three decades doing ministry with youth in gangs and prison. While most of society sees high-risk youth through lenses of fear or disregard, she has come to see them through God's eyes as having tremendous value and potential. 

Discover the Historic Legacy of Christian Abolitionists

In 2015, the historian Chris Momany helped discover a manuscript that had been forgotten in a storage closet at Adrian College in Michigan. He identified it as the journal of a nineteenth–century Christian abolitionist and missionary, David Ingraham. As Momany and a fellow historian Doug Strong pored over the diary, they realized that studying this document could open new conversations for twenty–first–century Christians to address the reality of racism today. They invited a multiracial team of fourteen scholars to join in, thus launching the Dialogue on Race and Faith Project.


Awakening to Justice presents the groundbreaking work of these scholars. In addition to reflecting on Ingraham's journal, chapters also explore the life and writings of two of Ingraham's Black colleagues, James Bradley and Nancy Prince. Appendixes feature writings by all three abolitionists so readers can engage the primary sources directly.

THE DIALOGUE ON RACE AND FAITH PROJECT brings together a multicultural team of Christian scholars to study a newly discovered abolitionist journal, to meet and travel to sites of importance from the nineteenth-century antislavery movement, and to discuss how issues of faith and race among abolitionists may provide a usable history for addressing the struggle for racial justice today. Project members and contributors include: Jemar Tisby, Christopher P. Momany, Sègbégnon Mathieu Gnonhossou, David D. Daniels III, R. Matthew Sigler, Douglas M. Strong, Diane Leclerc, Esther Chung-Kim, Albert G. Miller, and Estrelda Y. Alexander.

In addition to the book and study guide, the *Awakening to Justice* short film tells the story of the journey of these scholars working together on a subject that is challenging personally, educationally, and spiritually.

The Crossroads of Faith and Work – Multi-Author Q&A

There's often a separation between work, life, and faith—but as Christians, when we are living fully as God intended us to live, our work and faith are integrated seamlessly in our lives whether in a secular or Christian environment. What if we all found a way to see our faithful approach to work as way of advancing God's work?

What do you believe is God's view of work?

How does this belief inform both what you do for work and how you do it?

Jeff Haanen: Well, God views our work as good but fallen—like us. As such, God sees our work as an opportunity to develop a relationship with us—to work in us before he works through us. I believe both the what and the how of work should be a response to God's voice in our lives. Work is just one way we love God and neighbor.

In what ways do we allow work to form our faith?

Ross Chapman: God commanded us to follow his example: six days of work and one day of rest. That means work has a more outsized role in shaping our lives than anything else in terms of time, energy, focus, and priorities. Work need not be limited to paid work when we think of it this way; it includes family work, volunteer work, and the work we do for restful leisure. Whether we allow it to or not, work forms our faith.

How can we be redemptively transformed by God in our work?

Barry Rowan: God uses our work to do his work in us, and it is some of his most important, deepest work. As his work takes root in us, we will embrace challenges as fodder for our growth. Perseverance will work its way more deeply into the dough of our souls. We will be willing to empty ourselves and our desires for the benefit of others and the organizations we serve. As we are transformed by God, he will transform the world through us.

In what ways do practical and spiritual challenges limit us from connecting faith with work?

Ryan Tafilowski: There are all kinds of pressures that can make our lives at work unfruitful, spiritually. Western cultures have made an idolatry of work by placing it at the center of reality and identity, which malforms us away from the image of Jesus Christ. We also may face seasons where our work seems futile and pointless, where we just can't see how it makes any difference in the world. A better theological framework doesn't "solve" these problems, but it can alleviate some of the pain points.

How have you seen the challenges you have faced in the workplace grow your faith?


Gayle Beebe: I believe God has given us a great capacity to endure great loss and setback, and inevitably, we come to see his purposes at a deeper level when we persevere through challenges in the workplace.


What are some of the tangible ways our careers can serve the will of God? In what ways do you believe your career has served the will of God?

Joanna Meyer: When you start with the conviction that all work matters to God, then any form of work, when done with God and for his purposes, can serve his will. The challenge lies in bringing a gospel lens to your unique subject matter




