As interest in intelligent design has grown in the wider culture, William A. Dembski has assumed the role of public intellectual. In addition to lecturing around the world at colleges and universities, he is frequently interviewed on the radio and television. His work has been cited in numerous newspaper and magazine articles, including three front-page stories in the *New York Times* as well as the August 15, 2005, *Time* magazine cover story on intelligent design. He has appeared on the BBC, NPR, PBS, CSPAN2, CNN, FOX News, ABC's *Nightline* and *The Daily Show* with Jon Stewart.

A mathematician and philosopher, Dembski is Research Professor in Philosophy at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Ft. Worth. He is also a senior fellow with Discovery Institute's Center for Science and Culture in Seattle. Previously he was the Carl F. H. Henry Professor of Theology and Science at The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, where he founded its Center for Theology and Science. Before that he was Associate Research Professor in the Conceptual Foundations of Science at Baylor University where he also headed The Michael Polanyi Center, the first intelligent design think-tank at a major research university.

Dembski has taught at Northwestern University, the University of Notre Dame and the University of Dallas. He has done postdoctoral work in mathematics at MIT, in physics at the University of Chicago and in computer science at Princeton University. A graduate of the University of Illinois at Chicago where he earned a B.A. in psychology, an M.S. in statistics and a Ph.D. in philosophy, he also received a doctorate in mathematics from the University of Chicago in 1988 and a master of divinity degree from Princeton Theological Seminary in 1996. He has held National Science Foundation graduate and postdoctoral fellowships.
