Healing that Leads to Racial Reconciliation

Angle and Talking Points

People of color have endured traumatic histories and almost daily assaults on their dignity. As a child, Sheila Wise Rowe was bused across town to a majority white school, where she experienced the racist lie that one group is superior to all others. This lie continues to be perpetuated today by the action or inaction of the government, media, viral videos, churches, and sometimes even our family of origin. In contrast, Scripture declares that we are all fearfully and wonderfully made. Rowe, a professional counselor, exposes the symptoms of racial trauma to lead readers to a place of freedom from the past and new life for the future. This book offers three key principles:

- How racial trauma impacts people of color historically, generationally, and personally
- Why lament, grieving, and releasing anger are a necessary part of the healing process
- What skills all people of faith, regardless of color, need to acquire to allow for true racial reconciliation to take place




SHEILA WISE ROWE is a graduate of Tufts University and Cambridge College with a master's degree in counseling psychology. For over twenty-five years she has counseled abuse and trauma survivors in the United States. Sheila ministered to homeless and abused women and children in Johannesburg, South Africa, where she also taught counseling and trauma-related courses

for a decade. Sheila is the executive director of The Rehoboth House and the cofounder of The Cyrene Movement, an online community for people of color seeking healing for racial trauma. She is the author of *The Well of Life: Heal Your Pain, Satisfy Your Thirst, Live Your Purpose* along with *The Wonder Years*. She lives in the Boston area, where she is a writer, counselor, speaker, and spiritual director.

Angle and Talking Points

As our society increases in ethnic and religious diversity, millennials and the next generation of emerging adults harbor suspicions about traditional Christianity. They're looking for a faith that makes sense for the world they see around them. They want to know how Christianity relates to race, ethnicity, and societal injustices. Many young adults have rejected the Christian faith based on what they've seen in churches, the media, and politics. For them, Christianity looks a lot like a "white man's religion." Antipas L. Harris, a theologian and community activist, believes that biblical Christianity is more affirmative of cultural diversity than many realize. In this sweeping social, theological, and historical examination of Christianity, Harris responds to a list of hot topics from young Americans who struggle with the perception that Christianity is detached from the following matters:

- Justice
- Identity
- Culture



The Hope of Black Biblical Interpretation

Angle and Talking Points

Growing up in the American South, Esau McCaulley knew firsthand the ongoing struggle between despair and hope that marks the lives of some in the African American context. A key element in the fight for hope, he discovered, has long been the practice of Bible reading and interpretation that comes out of traditional Black churches. This ecclesial tradition is often disregarded or viewed with suspicion by much of the wider church and academy, but it has something vital to say.

Reading While Black is a personal and scholarly testament to the power and hope of Black biblical interpretation. At a time in which some within the African American community are questioning the place of the Christian faith in the struggle for justice, New Testament scholar McCaulley argues that reading Scripture from the perspective of Black church tradition is invaluable for connecting with a rich faith history and addressing the urgent issues of our times.

Ultimately, McCaulley calls the church to a dynamic theological engagement with Scripture, in which Christians of diverse backgrounds dialogue with their own social location as well as the cultures of others. *Reading While Black* moves the conversation forward.



Inquisitive, fiercely affectionate, staunchly opinionated, he sees the world through eyes of wonder and has yet to become jaded by society's cruelty. I know he'll grow up with stories of having been made to feel 'other' because of the color of his skin. I want to teach him that, though life's unfair, he still has incomparable value in the eyes of his heavenly Father. I know this wondrous little person has the potential to change the world—and I want him to know it too."

In *Mother to Son*, Jasmine Holmes shares a series of powerful letters to her young son. These are about her journey as an African American Christian and what she wants her son to know as he grows and approaches the world as a black man. Holmes deals head-on with issues ranging from discipleship and marriage to biblical justice. She invites us to read over her shoulder as she reminds Wynn that his identity is firmly planted in the person and work of Jesus Christ, even when the topic is one as emotionally charged as race in America.



- · We must break stereotypes and disprove false dichotomies.







Discipleship Before Diversity

Angle and Talking Points

"Many white Christians across America are waking up to the fact that something is seriously wrong—but often this is where we get stuck."

In this simple but powerful book, Pastor David Swanson contends that discipleship, not diversity, lies at the heart of our white churches' racial brokenness. Before white churches can pursue diversity, he argues, we must first take steps to address the faulty discipleship that has led to our segregation in the first place. Drawing on the work of philosopher James K. A. Smith and others, Swanson proposes that we rethink our churches' habits, or liturgies, and imagine together holistic, communal discipleship practices that can reform us as members of Christ's diverse body. His main points:

- There exists a cultural racial discipleship that has powerfully de-formed the imaginations of white Christians, leaving us powerless to pursue genuine reconciliation across lines of cultural division.
- Before pursuing diversity, white churches and ministries must address this racial discipleship and our historic blindness to it.
- Rather than reinventing entire ministries, white churches can reimagine their discipleship practices intentionally to counter racial discipleship while leading them toward embodied solidarity with their sisters and brothers of color.




DAVID W. SWANSON is the pastor of New Community Covenant Church, a multicultural congregation in Chicago's Bronzeville neighborhood. It's Time to Get Political

Angle and Talking Points

A generation of young Christians are weary of the political legacy they've inherited and are hungry for a better approach. They're tired of seeing their faith tied to political battles they didn't start, and they're frustrated with leaders they thought they could trust. Kaitlyn Schiess grew up in this landscape, and understands it from the inside.

In *The Liturgy of Politics*, Schiess shows that the church's politics are shaped by its habits and practices, even when it's unaware of them. Spiritual formation, and particularly a focus on formative practices, are experiencing a renaissance in Christian thinking—but these ideas are not often applied to the political sphere. Schiess insists that the way out of our political morass is first to recognize the formative power of the political forces all around us, and then to recover historic Christian practices that shape us according to the truth of the gospel.



Marlena Graves describes the process of emptying herself that allows her to move upward toward God and become the true self that God calls her to. For her, formation and justice always intertwine on the path to a balanced life of both action and contemplation. "I am bidding farewell to worldly status," Marlena says. "Along with Mary and Jesus, I am throwing my lot in with others who by the world's standards are disinherited and found at the bottom of all the hierarchies. Because I've found that God turns our hierarchies and our worldly values on their heads. It is only in our poverty and our intentional renunciation of worldly status seeking—in emptying ourselves of those ambitions—that we are ever open to being filled to the brim with grace. We cannot become full of God's life when we are chasing status, recognition, and honor from the world or the Christian culture—that only leads us to outer darkness. Like Jesus, we are to seek the lowest place and figure out exactly what that means for our particular lives."

- God's ladder of success is upside down. It is a climb down into the posture of servanthood, not being self-serving even when selfservice is disguised with church talk.
- Loving others, especially the poor, requires proximity to them, not distance and detachment.
- To be spiritually formed entails acting for justice. Spiritual disciplines, like prayer, cannot be separated from service (justice).



When the Israelites exclaimed, "Here are your gods!" at the sight of the golden calf, they were attempting to hold on to the God of their history while fashioning idols for their own purposes. In today's Western world, plenty of shiny false gods still hold power—idols of prosperity, nationalism, and self-interest. Christians desperately need to name and expose these idols. We must retrieve the biblical emphasis on idolatry and apply it anew in our journey of following Jesus.

In "Here Are Your Gods," Old Testament scholar Christopher J. H. Wright combines a biblical study of idolatry with practical discipleship. He calls readers to consider connections between Old Testament patterns and today's culture, especially recurring temptations to trust in political power.




