## The Glory and Supremacy of Christ

In *Philippians, Colossians*, InterVarsity Press's continuation of the Reformation Commentary on Scripture, Graham Tomlin describes how the Reformers found the main themes of the Pauline letters incredibly relevant for their own time, while also urging today's readers that the lessons extracted from these letters by the Reformers are still pertinent.

Stories like that of *Philippians* overflowing with thanksgiving in the midst of persecution and trials, and *Colossians* defending the superiority of Jesus as Lord over all principalities and powers show that at their heart, Paul's letters to the *Philippians* and *Colossians* celebrate the glory and supremacy of Jesus Christ and his saving work, a refrain that the Reformers never grew tired of singing. While their tones are diverse, the clarity of their compositions and the power of their voices still reverberate today.

This volume assembles a diverse chorus spanning place, time and confessional differences: from Italian reform-minded Catholic Gasparo Contarini and German Lutheran Martin Chemnitz, to Dutch Anabaptist Menno Simons, to French Reformed Theodore Beza. Scholars and pastors alike will find many fruitful insights from these and a number of other significant figures – most of whom enjoy fresh translations from the original, many for the first time in English.

### About the Reformation Commentary on Scripture

Following IVP Academic's critical success with the Ancient Christian Commentary on Scripture, this project is an important step in a churchwide effort of retrieval. "The Reformers saw themselves as standing in fundamental continuity with the early church fathers," says Timothy George, series editor. "The RCS seeks to present the Reformers and their engagement with the Bible in the context of the ongoing history of the people of God." The project brings together a team of world-class Reformation scholars under the leadership of general editor Timothy George and associate general editor Scott M. Manetsch. Each volume features a mix of major and minor voices from the era, with many texts appearing for the first time in English.

"In addition to their biblical studies, the Reformers were also keen to read the Scriptures in the company of the fathers and scholastics who preceded them," says George. "The RCS will allow pastors and teachers to compare the writings of the church fathers with the Reformers of the sixteenth century. In doing so, they will be able to assess both the continuity and the dissonance between these two major epochs in biblical interpretation."

Projected to be a twenty-eight-volume biblical commentary, the series puts the words of the Reformers directly into the hands of the contemporary church.

**Graham Tomlin** (Ph.D., Exeter University) is dean of St. Mellitus College, London. He taught on Martin Luther and the Reformation in the theology faculty of the University of Oxford for eight years. He is the author, among many other publications, of *The Power of the Cross: Theology and the Death of Christ in Paul, Luther and Pascal* and *Luther and His World*.


