

## Simple, but Not Simplistic, Prayers

I am a Cubs fan. This short statement tells you so much about me. It tells you that I am loyal. It tells you that I have the ability to believe in the unseen. To be able to faithfully root for a team that went 108 years between World Series wins requires an incredible amount of loyalty. Over the years I have learned that there are certain words and phrases that have special meaning to Cubs fans. Words that seem innocuous to most are near and dear to our hearts. Words paint pictures and invite us into experiences. For Cubs fans, words like *brick* and *ivy* bring a smile to our faces — and on the other side of the coin, words like *curse* and *Bartman* send chills down our spines.

The words we say and how we say them matter a great deal. Simple prayers are powerful because of that fact. Our words are loaded with our emotions and experiences, and when we use them we are painting pictures for people to examine and inviting them into experiences.

#### The Original Simple Prayer

This idea of praying short phrases or words is not new. For as long as people have been praying, they have wanted their prayers to take them beyond the surface and plunge them deep into the presence of God. Two important mystics were some of the first to pray simple prayers. The first, John Cassian (AD 360–435), was born in present-day Romania and in his youth traveled to a monastery in Bethlehem to live an ascetic life. Cassian believed that the monk ought to be attentive to God alone; this attention produces a union with God that has several forms. In his work *Conferences*, Cassian introduces the Eastern monastic practice of *monologistos*—a prayer that consists of a single phrase or word. The Jesus Prayer is perhaps the most popular monologistos.

The second mystic is John Climacus (AD 579–649), who wrote the spiritual classic *Ladder of Divine Ascent* and found the ideal prayer to be a monologistos. Climacus writes, "Do not launch out into long discourses that fritter away your mind in efforts for eloquence. One word alone spoken by the Publican touched God's mercy; a single word full of faith saved the Good Thief. Prolixity in prayer often fills the mind with images and distracts it, while often one single word draws into recollection." These words redirected my prayer life.

The single-word prayer was not to be an accompaniment to but the very essence of one's breath. What is offered is not a ritualistic prayer but a rhythm of life to enter into. A monologistos serves the soul in the same manner that breathing serves the body, providing strength and vitality. The simple prayer serves as a source of life in the midst of life.

#### **Practicing These Simple Words to Pray**

I love the Hebrew wisdom literature. The honest and raw emotion of it appeals to me. The rhythm of the writing is smooth and abrupt, sometimes in the same moment. The crown

jewel of the genre is the Psalms. The Psalms were used in public worship in Israel as well as for private devotions. They show us how intimate and free our relationship with God can be as we share every thought and feeling with him. Among the thousands of words that the Scriptures offer us to guide our prayers, there are a few that I want us to consider and embrace as examples of a modern-day monologistos—a new simple prayer in the vein of the mystics.

*Selah.* I am finding that my life is getting more and more full, often with good things-kingdom things even — but even so, there are moments when the prayer of my life needs to be a simple prayer of selah. When life is too good to rush by, simply pray *selah*. When there is news that is overwhelming and it is hard to find the next breath, *selah*. Life can easily be lived and not enjoyed. We can move from conversation to conversation and not allow ourselves to be known.

You know me. To be known by God is more than saying that God is aware of us; it is to say that God desires to inhabit every detail of our lives. God is not looking for a social media relationship with us, a relationship from afar. A need for intimacy is woven into us, and we all wander until we find our home in God. I remember watching the sitcom *Cheers* when I was younger. I loved when Norm would cross the threshold of the bar, and everyone greeted him with a loud, "Norm." He was beloved, he was known. Take a moment and pray this simple prayer: You know me. Allow each repetition of this prayer to provide more and more assurance to your heart that you are indeed known by God. Your actions cannot undo this and you cannot earn it. You are not known as the sum of your skills or achievements. You are not embraced by the love of God because you have accumulated wealth or possess status. You are known because you are the beloved of God.

*Hosanna*. The cry to be saved comes from a place of desperation. This cry testifies that the present isn't what it could or should be. It asserts that the one praying isn't the one who can save. Like those crying out along the road as Jesus rides into town, I want to be rescued — even if I may not fully know from what.

In keeping with the Christian mystics, these single-word simple prayers are powerful for us. Like all simple prayers they create space for the Spirit to commune with us as we pray. This requires space. There are moments in our lives when we know that too much speech is harmful. Each of these simple prayers is designed to make us pause, settle in, and return. The pause is the moment when we acknowledge that we could move on from this moment but make the decision not to. Prayer is retreating from the natural world to find ourselves when we are with God. Each of these words can serve as a simple prayer. They remind us that some moments invite us into moments of pause.


