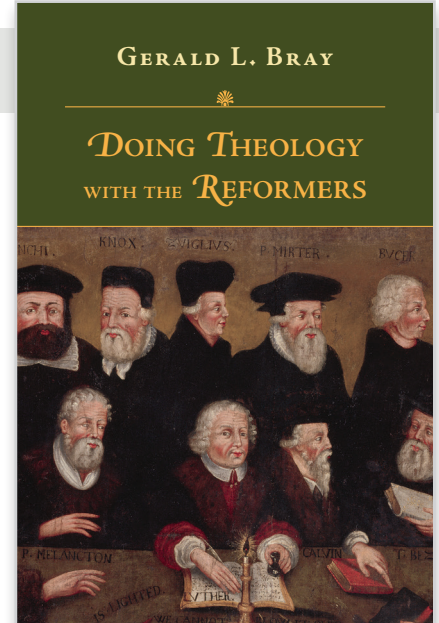
The Reformation was a time of tremendous upheaval, renewal, and vitality in the life of the church.
