

Age is No Barrier to Service

What motivated you to write this book?

Terence Lester: For the past decade, our family has been working with adults to foster understanding and compassion toward the unhoused community. We noticed that misconceptions often led to fear, which adults could easily pass on to their children. This book aims to educate parents and value each person as worthy in the eyes of God. Co-authored by myself (Terence) and my daughter, Zion, the book is based on our real-life relationship and experiences.

Briefly summarize the central thesis of your book. What is distinctive about this idea and/or your approach?

Terence: The core message of our book is that age is no barrier to service; children can learn to value people, whether they have a permanent address or not. Our unique approach lies in showing how a child's compassion can create a ripple effect, inspiring others to serve as well.

What are the five main things you want readers to take away from your book?

Terence:

- Our children are always observing us—how we behave in our families, communities, and professions.
- Age is not a barrier to compassion; children can learn empathy toward those in vulnerable situations.
- Parents have the opportunity to be role models of service, both in religious and worldly contexts.
- Opportunities exist to empower children with service ideas, regardless of their age.
- Supporting children's initiatives can have a cascading positive impact on other children and families.

Is there anything else you want to let us know about the book?

Terence: This book is based on actual events. Zion's early exposure to serving vulnerable people inspired her to initiate a campaign among her second-grade peers, eventually involving her entire school.
